

REWITNESSED CORNER FOR STATE OF OREGON - DEPARTMENT OF FORESTRY

Section corner common to Sections 21, 22, 27 and 28, T2S, R7W, W.M., Tillamook County, Oregon.

ORIGINAL by Albert P. Wilson, July 13, 1891.

Post; missing.

- 12" Hemlock bears S70E 25 lks.; now a 10"x4 ft. high badly rotted stub with portions of scribes 7 BT visible,
- 26" Larch bears S27W 19 lks.; now a 26"x2 ft. high badly rotted stub with axe work visible.
- 6" Hemlock bears N29W 49 lks.; missing.
- 12" Hemlock bears N71 3/4E 93 lks.; missing.

RESTORATION by Louis W. Amort RE2311 January 29, 1952 (Book 2, page 123, Tillamook County Records).

1 1/2"x36" galvanized iron pipe with 3" bronze cap, 30" in ground; under 4 ft. diameter fir log; in place 34" in ground, I notched the log to expose the pipe.

- 60" Fir stub bears N53W 38.2 ft.; now a 49" badly rotted stump with scribes S21 BT 2311 visible.
- 30" Fir stub bears S84E 63.0 ft.; now 22" badly rotted with scribes T2S R7S S27 BT visible.
- 64" Fir snag bears N18E 45.7 ft.; now a 54" burnt and badly rotted stump with upper portion laying alongside, no face visible.

REWITNESSED October 28, 1988

Var. 21 1/2E

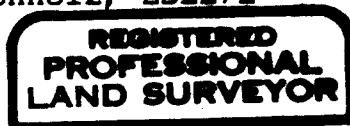
From the above pipe with marks "LS1998 1988" added, and from which a:

- 15" Fir bears N14 1/2W 21.6 ft. to face; scribed T2SR7WS21BT.
- 17" Fir bears N78E 5.0 ft. to face; scribed T2SR7WS22BT.
- 10" Fir bears S30E 31.4 ft. to face; scribed T2SR7WS27BT.
- 17" Fir bears S44W 19.0 ft. to face; scribed T2SR7WS28BT.

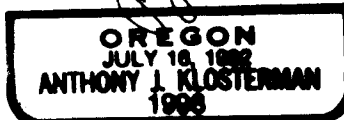
Metal location poster on new BTs.
