MEETING INFORMATION AND RULES

- Matters for discussion and consideration by the board shall be placed on an agenda prepared by the staff and approved by the board chair. Any commissioner may request items on the agenda.
- Public hearings are formal proceedings publicized through a special public notice issued to media and others. Public hearings held by the board are to provide the board an opportunity to hear from the public about a specific topic. Public hearings are therefore different regarding audience participation at board meetings.
- Commissioners shall be addressed by their title followed by their last name.
- Commissioners shall obtain approval from the chair before speaking or asking questions of staff, presenters, and public. As a courtesy, the chair shall allow an opportunity, by the commissioner who has the floor, to ask immediate follow-up questions.
- Masks, face coverings or face shields must be worn in the courthouse by State order. Masks must be worn while giving comment.
- A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum and be necessary for the transaction of business.
- All board meeting notices are publicized in accordance with public meeting laws.
- All board meetings shall commence with the Pledge of Allegiance.
- The chair will utilize the gavel as needed to maintain order, commence and adjourn meetings, and signal approval of motions.
- The board reserves the right to recess to executive session as may be required at any time during these meetings, pursuant to ORS 192.660(1).
- The courthouse is accessible to persons with disabilities. If special accommodations are needed for persons with hearing visual, or manual impairments who wish to participate in the meeting, contact (503) 842-3403 at least 24 hours prior to the meeting so that the appropriate communications assistance can be arranged.

PUBLIC COMMENT

- Providing public comment is an opportunity for constituents to be heard and express their views to the board.
- The board allows public comment at board meetings during the public comment period designated on the agenda.
- Comments are limited to one per person and per agenda item.
- Comments must be related to the agenda item(s) previously registered to comment on.
- The allotted time for public comments is two minutes per person; this time may not be allotted to another speaker. The chair may, at their sole discretion, further limit or expand the amount of time.
- The public comment opportunity is not a discussion, debate, or dialogue between the speaker and the board, which may or may not respond.
- Members of the public do not have the right to disrupt the meeting; the board may prohibit demonstrations such as booing, hissing, or clapping.
- Remarks containing hate speech, profanity, obscenity, name calling or personal attacks, defamation to a person, people, or organization, or other remarks the board deems inappropriate will not be allowed.
- Failure to follow all rules and procedures may result in not being able to provide public comment and/or being removed from the meeting.

item you would like to comment on. When your name is announced, please come forward to the table
placed in front of the dais and for the record, first identify yourself, area of residence, and organization
represented, if any.

- When logged in to the meeting you must remain muted with your camera off until your name is called, then you may unmute and turn on your camera.
- The chair may require those providing virtual comment to turn on their camera while providing comment or testimony.

Dear county commissioners,

This is a request to please allow oceanside to vote on the request of incorporation. As someone who has stewardship over much of Oceanside and has been very much involved with the town of oceanside, whether through the United States Post Office, revamping the Anchor to the Three Arch inn, as well as an being an EMT, water rescue team leader, and firefighter for Oceanside for a decade, i am shocked and appalled by your decision. The belief that you know what is needed more than those who have risked their lives and spent countless hours trying to protect this area is incredibly condescending at best and hurtful at its base.

It is incredibly disturbing the amount of recorded back pedaling and contradictory statements by this group and the other officials in this process. The inability to even have the treasurer show up to meetings, is even more worrisome. It looks to

the public as if you failed to do any due diligence.

As someone who has helped collect and generate transient tax money it is horrific how the money takes from these small villages and gives zero in return except for, overwhelming the roads, sewer, water, EMS and Fire, and Law enforcement as well.

It seems we are at a point where we will have to think about protection not from just land development, resources stripping and tourist creating overcapacity of all civil resources but, from

the county commissioners now nas well. Take a look

at the actions being enabled in Pacific City. Ie; overriding the voice of the city for another hotel by the same group that no one wants and we definitely do not need. Nestucca doesn't even have a water rescue team, they can't protect our local dory fleet even. They have to call Oceanside, which then puts our community at risk and uses our own tax revenue to operate....

It seems like a waste of everyone's time and resources having to establish precedent of accountability in LUBA court.

In conclusion I urge you to reevaluate your role in this process and reconsider the decision to not allow citizens to vote. You have the power to be the group that actually fights for the people and not just be trampled by VRBO, Vacasa, Pelican Pub, etc.

At the time of intake, most Jlls who are identified as needing treatment (due to releasing authority conditions and/or risk/needs assessment) are usually referred to Tillamook Family Counseling. Program Description:	Tillamook County began a Behaviroal Health Court in February of 2020. The Behaviroal Health Court has a maximum of 20 participants who all work directly with team members. At times there are supports identified that are needed by court participants. These items would follow the CJC allowable expenses. There is also a protocol set in place to track and ensure that the support is approved by the team as a whole and would assist the participant to continuing positive behavior change. In addition, there are at times a need for an incentive; like moving to a new phase, recognicition of positive behavior, or graduation. These incentives would also follow the CJC allowable expenses and the protocol that has been set in place by the steering committee. The participant supports and incentives costs are funded with a CJC Specialty Court Grant.				
	In addition to the above, there was an opportunity to apply for a CJC Specialty Court Innovation Grant. An application was submitted and included an ask for lab tops, printers, computer desks, chairs, plexiglass station dividers, cell phones, and cell phone data cards. This was requested in response to the impacts COVID has had on the Behavioral Health Court. Court is still being conducted virtually using Webex platform. Many participants do not have access to technology equipment or have an understanding of how to use it. Futher, many cannot afford the cost to continue data plans that allow for virtual court and treatment sessions. The goal would be to create a small scale computer work center for the participants to come and attend virtual court, treatment sessions, work on their phase paper work, employment searches, etc. In addition, Tillamook Family Couseling has been providing cell phones and data cards to those in need. This is not something that they can continue for the forseeable future. These additional funds will assist with continuing the supports of these items.

OFFENDER POPULATION TO BE SERVED:

 The Tillamook County Sheriff's Office Community Corrections Division provides supervision, substance abuse outpatient treatment programs, and other programs and resources to felony and qualified misdemeanor Justice Involved Individuals (Jlls) who are determined to be of medium to high-risk to reoffend based on assessments using validated risk tools. The Community Corrections Division identifies eligible Measure 57 cases during the intake process. Funds allocated to the Tillamook County Sheriff's Office Community Correction Division under Measure 57 will be used solely for this purpose.

THE TREAMENT PROGRAMS BEING USED AND THE INTENSITY AND DURATION THAT HAS **BEEN DESIGNED INTO YOUR APPROACH:**

- The Community Corrections Division contracts with the Tillamook Family Counseling Center (TFCC) and Orenda Counseling Services to provide treatment services to Measure 57 JIIs. The Measure 57 supervision and treatment programs employs evidence-based practices to address non-compliant behavior and risk factors that often result in recidivism and are barriers to successful completion of community supervision. This is achieved through a partnership with Tillamook Family Counseling and Orenda Counseling to provide outpatient treatment services coupled with an intensive supervision program.
- The TFCC Treatment program is designed to be two to six months in duration but can be extended based on offender compliance and specific treatment need. Criminogenic risk factors are address during the treatment program to effect lasting behavior change.

- The Lowering Barriers Treatment Program is a 10-week course held on Saturdays. Joan Ayala with Orenda Counseling is the facilitator of this course and uses a variety of evidenced based curriculum. This group focuses on those who have not succeeded at other treatment, need additional treatment groups, or would benefit from treatment readiness.
- Jils referred to either program will undergo a full assessment performed by a Tillamook Family Counseling Center clinician or Orenda Counseling to determine specific treatment needs. TFCC staff and Orenda Counseling will collaborate with the Community Corrections staff on case plans; coordinating the start of a treatment program or other services that may be deemed necessary. The PSC, LSCMI and WRNA will be used to designate medium and high-risk offenders; which are the priority target for this program.
- JIIs assigned to the Measure 57 treatment program(s) will be required to report to their supervising officer weekly and sometimes multiple times per week in addition to attending the weekly outpatient program either administered by a TFCC clinician at the TCSO Community Corrections Division office or Orenda Counseling at a local Church that is centrally located and allows use of a classroom or cafeteria. Depending on the JII's compliance levels, weekly reporting schedules can be adjusted as they progress through the program and demonstrate substantial progress and behavior change. Evaluations of compliance will be conducted to determine a continuation within the program or identify additional treatment and/or supervision needs.
- Case plans will be developed between the treatment providers and TCSO Community
 Corrections Staff to address treatment and supervision needs, identify barriers to
 success and develop a specific approach to effect lasting offender behavior change.
 Progress reports will be submitted to Community Corrections staff as well as a monthly
 staff meeting with the treatment providers to measure offender progress. Program
 tracking will take place using the Corrections Information System. Programs will consist
 of close coordination with the Community Corrections Deputy to ensure accountability
 and success of the JII.
- Treatment groups available to Measure 57 clients, administered by TFCC clinicians will consist of the following material: Foundations Group, Recovery Skills Group, Cog Skills Group, Managing Emotions Group, Transitions (AIP) Group, Co-occurring Disorders (COD) and Mental Health (MH) treatment. Psychiatric assessment with medication management will be initiated if determined to be a need. Orenda Counseling Center uses various curriculum that includes, Gorski Phases of Relapse & Prevention, Stages of change, DBT, CB, Milkman-Criminality, Seeking Safety and Hazelden Matric Curriculum.
- The total number of participants for the TFCC treatment group is a maximum of 20 at any given time. There will be JIIs at different stages of treatment, hence, they will be

entering and departing the program at different stages. It is estimated there could be 20-50 different JIIs participating over a one-year period. Pre-COVID participation was estimated to be 8-12 JIIs weekly in the outpatient treatment and supervision program. Orenda Counseling holds Lowering Barriers twice a year. We can refer up to 14 JIIs for this program at once. However, past attendees have always been welcomed back. Therefore, we could see anywhere from 28-35 JIIs a year participate. This is a 10-week course that meets on Saturdays.

- To further address substance abuse and non-compliant behavior, urinalyses testing will be conducted by Community Corrections staff using the Alcohol and Drug Intervention Program (ADIP). This is a color-code, random urinalysis program used to measure relapse and substance abuse treatment needs for JIIs. Tillamook Family Counseling Center also employs a similar color code program for random urinalyses in conjunction with their treatment groups.
- Jlls in the who fail to comply with reporting and treatment instructions will be referred to their supervising officer and may be subject to sanction or other intervention in an effort to have the offender re-engage in the supervision and treatment program.
- Jils who submit three negative urinalysis samples over a 90-day period and have successfully completed all aspects of the treatment will successfully complete the Measure 57 program. Jils who have successfully completed this program who later display signs of non-compliance and/or replaces may be re-referred.
- A jail clinician that will be funded by M57, Specialty Court Grant and Justice
 Reinvestment Funds will reimplement treatment groups for Adults in Custody (AICs) at
 the Tillamook County Jail. The clinician will also be available to conduct evaluations
 amongst other tasks. Based on the ability to fund this position using various funding
 streams, along with the need for a clinician in the jail it is determined that the logistical
 issues will be navigated, and we will be able to serve a larger population.

- The Tillamook County Sheriff's Office Community Corrections Division utilizes a number
 of structured sanctions and/or interventions to address non-compliant behavior. They
 include but are not limited to: Community service hours; increased reporting, work
 crew, Alcohol and Drug Intervention Program (color code) and Carey Guides. Depending
 on the level of non-compliance, a custody sanction may also be imposed.
- Tillamook County Work Crew is partially funded by Measure 57 funds. When
 appropriate, the JII will be referred to alternative sanctions such as work crew in-lieu of
 jail. JIIs on work crew be able to address non-compliant behavioral while gaining
 valuable skills and making a positive impact on the community.

- We will also be looking to contract with a partnering agency to provide a Peer Support Specialist in the Community Corrections Division. This position will be able to assist all JIIs but a focus will be those that are Measure 57 crimes as well as those with a downward departure or stipulated prison sentence. This position will assist with various needs of the JII and work on individualized wrap around services to help knock down barriers and promote positive behavior change.
- Rewards/Incentives used to motivate and promote offender success include but are not limited to: Bus passes, decreased reporting options, and certificates of completion.

We are submitting this letter of support for the Tillamook County Transportation District's (TCTD) Pacific City Shuttle vehicle expansion grant request to purchase trolleys for its fleet.

In 2018, the TCTD began operating the Pacific City Shuttle as a "pilot project" to alleviate traffic congestion and parking shortages during the peak tourist season. The pilot project was born out of the Cape Kiwanda Master Plan and the Pacific City-Woods Parking Management Plan, and the TCTD has been an eager and enthusiastic partner since the beginning.

Each year, the TCTD listens to community partners' input on how the service can be improved to meet the needs of visitors and locals. This past year, the TCTD greatly expanded the shuttle route, providing opportunities for people to connect with the Sitka Sedge State Natural Area, Bob Straub State Park, and many businesses, beach accesses, and other landmarks and attractions.

The Pacific City Shuttle operates on weekends during summer months and over the past three years ridership on the shuttle has increased annually. During the 2021 season, the program helped to disperse more than 1,150 riders throughout Pacific City area attractions, despite limitations experienced due to COVID-19 restrictions. Pacific City is fortunate to experience such high visitor demand during the summer months, but this greatly increases the seasonal population which results in traffic congestion and uncontrolled parking that leads to many quality-of-life frustrations for our local residents. The shuttle program reduces the number of vehicles on the roadways and in public parking areas. This has led to the protection of sensitive ecological areas where our visitors may creatively fashion their own parking spaces. The shuttle program also helps to reduce overall vehicle emissions, as well as long-term maintenance required on our rural roadways.

The trolleys will enhance visibility and the public generally views trolleys as being fun. If the past experience of other communities holds true, these trolleys will enhance the visitor's experience in Pacific City. The end result will be a larger number of tourists parking their cars and riding the trolleys to reach their destinations.

We support TCTD's application to purchase two trolleys for the Pacific City Shuttle service and recommend your approval of funding.
