Public hearings are therefore different regarding audience participation at board meetings.
- Commissioners shall be addressed by their title followed by their last name.
- Commissioners shall obtain approval from the chair before speaking or asking questions of staff, presenters, and public. As a courtesy, the chair shall allow an opportunity, by the commissioner who has the floor, to ask immediate follow-up questions.
- A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum and be necessary for the transaction of business.
- All board meeting notices are publicized in accordance with public meeting laws.
- All board meetings shall commence with the Pledge of Allegiance.
- The chair will utilize the gavel as needed to maintain order, commence and adjourn meetings, and signal approval of motions.
- The board reserves the right to recess to executive session as may be required at any time during these meetings, pursuant to ORS 192.660(1).

We would like to provide comments on why we support a "pause" in issuing STR permits in unincorporated Tillamook County. As full-time residents we are very concerned on the negative impact of short term rental properties. Here are our immediate concerns:

- 1. We live in South Beach, Neskowin. Our roads are privately owned and maintained. In the past 3 years we have noticed an exponential increase of traffic, due to renters, contractors, and general maintenance companies that service all the rentals. An increase in STR traffic adds a disproportionate amount of wear and tear on our roads which becomes an additional financial burden to all the homeowners here.
- 2. Limited parking. Many renters overbook, unbeknownst to the owner, and ignore the county's ordinances of one car per bedroom plus one. Overbooking leads to more cars parking on the roadside and or on vacant private property. Multi-car issues often occur over the weekend when the county is not available to enforce the parking ordinance. There are occasions, in some areas of South Beach, that transform into mini parking lots.
- 3. There are some individuals who purchase homes with the sole intent to operate a boutique hotel business. Rarely do these owners occupy these businesses for personal use. This is a direct violation of Ordinance 84, which prohibits any commercial businesses in an R-1 residential zone.
- 4. Increased bad behavior. Renters/contractors are prone to dumping their trash along the road or unmarked parking areas, speeding, and vandalism (spray painted the speed bumps so they can drive faster and vacationers painting the riprap). Enforcement to stop this type of behavior is non-existent. We get no support from the Sheriff's Department.
- 5. A strain on water resources and sanitation services. Many rentals have an occupancy of 12-20 people. That's 12-20 showers a day, multiple daily toilet usage, increased usage of washing machines and dishwashers. Despite all the rain we have had this year, as of March, Tillamook County is classified as a moderate drought zone. Daily water usage from these rental properties puts increased demands on the water supply and the sewer systems that the residents of South Beach depend on. If the number of rentals keeps increasing, the ability to manage our water source, not only for domestic use but also fire emergencies, will become increasingly more difficult.
- 6. Increasing the amount of STR's also puts more pressure on enforcing ordinances. As it is, the county has a finite budget, which results in limited or no enforcement at all.

Our hope is the commissioners will consider all of these issues and agree that we need to put a stop to additional STRs in Neskowin.

Dear Chair Yamamoto, Vice Chair Skaar, and Commissioner Bell:

My name is Tom Prehoditch. My wife, Vickie, and I have been property owners in Neskowin for 20 years and full-time residents for 6 years. I am writing you in reference to item number 13 identified on the agenda for your board meeting on May 11 as "Continuation of Discussion of Short-Term Rental Program." Although I am a member of the six member Neskowin Citizen Advisory short term rental subcommittee, I am writing you not on its behalf but rather in my individual capacity and as a supporter of the Neskowin group, Save Our Neighborhoods. I am one of several authors of the position paper of Save Our Neighborhoods, which can be found at <a href="https://save-our-neighborhoods.org">https://save-our-neighborhoods.org</a>.

I strongly support the pause on the issuance of permits for short term rentals ("STRs) until a thorough review and consideration of STR issues can be accomplished by county staff, its STR committees, and the Board of Commissioners.

The data that Ms. Absher presented to you at your board meeting on April 27 provides a substantial basis for such a pause. That data conclusively demonstrates the dramatic increase in STRs in Tillamook County and in Neskowin in roughly 3½ years. As just one example, in Neskowin during that time period, the number of STRs has grown from approximately 100 STRs to somewhere between 140 and 150 today, and from approximately 12% of all improved properties to approximately 17% today. If such a rate of growth continues, which it likely will without action by the county, within 10 years that number will rise to approximately 300 STRs in Neskowin, and maybe more. Similar increases in STRs are occurring in other communities in unincorporated Tillamook County. As Ms. Absher related to you, the number of STR permits issued in the first four months of 2022 in Tillamook County is double that for the comparable period in 2021 (i.e. 59 in 2022, and 29 in 2021).

Save Our Neighborhoods predicted that this dramatic increase in STRs in Tillamook County and Neskowin would occur. As jurisdictions around us amended or were (and are) in the process of enhancing short term rental regulations, it was foreseeable that Tillamook County, and particularly the beach communities in unincorporated areas of the county like Neskowin, would become magnets for STRs. That has happened, and in fact at a rate of increase that even we did not expect.

Save Our Neighborhoods and Neskowin residents have also identified the negative impacts of the increase in STRs in Neskowin on livability in residential zones. At least those of us who are permanent or part time residents of Neskowin observe them frequently. These include but are not limited to traffic congestion and speeding, excess noise, garbage issues, illegal parking, over occupancy of rentals, wear and tear on neighborhood infrastructure, environmental impacts, and impacts on the availability of long-term rental housing.

The county should be applauded for its continuing attempts to enhance enforcement of Ordinance 84, the existing STR ordinance, and the implementation of the "Hello Neighbor" program. However, although enhanced enforcement and "Hello Neighbor" are necessary steps, they are not sufficient to counter the growing problems associated with the dramatic increase of STRs. Any ability to properly regulate STRs will soon be outrun by their increasing numbers.

Without describing all of Save Our Neighborhoods' proposals here, among other things, it has proposed for discussion in Neskowin a limit on the number or percentage of STRs and a limit on the concentration or density of STRs in Neskowin that could be extended to other unincorporated communities in Tillamook County. A full consideration of such limits or "caps" (as well as other STR issues) provides a substantial rationale and basis for a temporary pause on the issuance of STR permits.

One last matter: "Property rights" arguments have often been invoked by STR advocates. Those of us who neither have STRs nor will have STRs in the future have property rights too, and those rights are also recognized in law and must be acknowledged in the process of considering amendments and changes to Ordinance 84. It is a large part of the business of local jurisdictions and particularly their elected officials and land use planning departments to attempt to compromise competing property rights in the communities they serve. That is in fact a substantial part of what the Department of Community Development does and county zoning ordinances and other ordinances like Ordinance 84 are intended to do. We simply ask that everyone involved in this process keeps in mind that those of us who do not own or have an interest in STRs are your neighbors and also have property rights that must be considered in the process of revisiting Ordinance 84.

My wife, Vickie, joins me in the thoughts conveyed in this letter.

Comments Regarding Limiting Short Term Rentals in Neahkahnie

My name is David Boone and I am a full-time resident of Neahkahnie and a member of the Board of Commissioners for the Neahkahnie Water District. I have several comments and thoughts regarding the effect of short-term rentals on our community. First, I want to be clear that I am not opposed to certain properties being used as short-term rentals. Before moving to Oregon in 2015, we rented properties in various areas on the coast including Arch Cape, Cannon Beach and Neahkahnie. Renting a house is a great way to stay in an area long enough truly enjoy the region in a more relaxed way.

One of the aspects of renting a house that we enjoyed was experiencing a neighborhood. That is also one of the reasons we did not rent in Seaside or parts of Lincoln county. Unfortunately the beach area of Neahkahnie is starting to feel less like a neighborhood since most of the short-term rental houses in Neahkahnie are located close to beach access.

### Current Composition of Neahkahnie

- 1. About 170 full time residents in 2022
- 2. About 100 residences with full-time occupants
- 3. About 214 residences with part-time occupants (non-local mailing addresses)
- 4. 70 permitted short-term rentals (last list I saw)

### Some observations about short-term rentals in Neahkahnie.

- 1. One out of state owner has properties with more than 50 advertised beds, i.e. one STR owner can sleep more than 25% of the full-time residents of Neahkahnie.
- 2. In the July/August 2021 period, STRs on average used 50% more water than full-time residents on average.
- 3. Not all STRs are the same. The top 11 STR water users (out of 70) used more than 40% of the water used by all permitted STRs.
- 4. Certain STRs are being run as mini-hotels, having business conferences and gatherings of more than 20 people.
- 5. Current level of STRs (70) is equal to 70% of the full-time occupied residences (100).

### Positive effect of STRs.

- 1. Revenue for the county.
- 2. Some tourist revenue for local businesses.

### Some impact of STRs in Neahkahnie:

1. Impact on natural resources. Neahkahnie has a limited water supply (4 springs). This past July 4<sup>th</sup> weekend, our instantaneous water demand exceeded our spring output for more than 8 hours. STRs operated as businesses use significantly more water than part-time residents or even full-time residents. One residence that was recently converted to an STR used more water in its first business billing period than the elderly former full-time owner used in the previous 17 billing periods combined. Continuing the unlimited permitting of STRs will present a significant challenge for the Neahkahnie Water District.

- 2. Volunteers. Tillamook county depends very heavily on volunteers to function. For example, the county health department used many volunteers to staff the covid vaccination clinics last fall. Of the more than 80 volunteers during one of the months, more than 50 came from the Nehalem Bay area. Most were full-time residents, some were part-time residents, NONE were STR occupants.
- 3. When STR permitting apparently started in 2010, there were 25 permits issued in Neahkahnie (even though Neahkahnie's community plan did not permit such businesses). Now there are 70 (180% increase).
- 4. Neahkahnie's neighbor to the south, Manzanita, has capped the number of STRs it will permit. That means STR business owners are buying Neahkahnie residences to convert to STRs. Manzanita only permits one STR per owner. As indicated above, Neahkahnie has owners of multiple STRs.
- 5. There are very few long-term rentals now available in Neahkahnie since owners can make more money from an STR.

Currently, Neahkahnie has about 18% STRs (depending on the denominator used). The operative question is what level of STRs can a community tolerate before it irreversibly changes? For example, Chelan county in Washington State has reportedly decided a 6% cap for most of the county is appropriate. Tillamook county needs to undertake a serious study of this issue with input from all the interested parties, particularly full-time (voting) residents. To avoid further harm to Neahkahnie as well as other unincorporated communities in Tillamook, the Commissioners should immediate suspend granting STR permits while seriously studying this issue.

Dear Commissioner Yamamoto, Commissioner Skaar and Commissioner Bell,

My name is Jacki Hinton, and I am a full-time resident of Neahkahnie. My husband and I chose to move from Colorado to Oregon 8 years ago. We thought Neahkahnie was the perfect location for us with its quiet, peaceful neighborhoods, strong sense of community, and actively involved residents. Sadly, these features of Neahkahnie have diminished significantly in 8 short years.

Many single family homes in Neahkahnie have been converted into profitable short-term rental businesses. Currently more than 18% of Neahkahnie's total dwellings are permitted for short-term rental use. Soaring home prices and bidding wars lead to more and more long-time residences being purchased for business use as prices exceed amounts most of us can afford for residential use. Homes typically occupied by 2-4 family members now are filled with 6-20 vacationers. This seriously impacts the safety of our roads, causes significant parking issues, challenges our limited water resources and diminishes the peaceful nature of our community. The uncontrolled growth of short-term rentals further impacts our coastal communities which rely heavily on the volunteerism of residents while vacationers come and go. As our local homes are converted to short-term rental businesses and a few individuals reap the profits, the residents are left with the substantial burdens of those businesses and the challenges of keeping our communities functioning.

I am not advocating for a ban on short-term rentals. In fact, my family often chooses to stay in short-term rentals when traveling. What I am advocating for is a reasonable cap on the number of short-term rentals to preserve the livability and unique character of our coastal communities.

I also strongly support instituting a "pause" on the issuance of STR permits in Tillamook County to allow sufficient time for the STR Advisory Committee to complete its work and the Commissioners to make well informed, thoughtful decisions about the regulation of short-term rentals moving forward. Without such a "pause", the damaging imbalance of short-term rentals to actual residences will grow as the demand for STR permits continues to escalate. Please take a "pause" on issuing permits to prevent further harm to our communities while the deliberative process continues.

I'm very concerned about the pause in STR in Tillamook County.


My wife and I are school teachers and have invested in Tillamook County with a ownership group. We are middle to lower class wage earners.

We worked with David McCall at the Tillamook County Solid Waste Department and the three-transfer station during the multiple years. The program brought in almost 800 tons in 2013-2015 and 2,500 tons in 2018-2021 of yard debris from around the county. We have had a lot of the community support with the program and statements saying that this is a great program for the county. The project provided an easy way for homeowners to easily dispose of their yard debris. Also, it provides an easy avenue for

education, prevention, and outreach opportunity focusing on the Firewise Community program and the Tillamook County CWPP.

### Sec. 3. Definitions

### (7) FEDERAL LAND.

The term 'Federal land' means-

- (A) land within the National Forest System, as defined in section 11(a) of the Forest and Rangeland Renewable Resources Planning Act of 1974 (16 U.S.C. 1609(a)) exclusive of the National Grasslands and land utilization pursuant to the Act of July 22, 1937 (7 U.S.C. 1010–1012); and
- (B) such portions of the revested Oregon and California Railroad and reconveyed Coos Bay Wagon Road grant land as are or may hereafter come under the jurisdiction of the Department of the Interior, which have heretofore or may hereafter be classified as timberlands, and power-site land valuable for timber, that shall be managed, except as provided in the former section 3 of the Act of August 28, 1937 (50 Stat. 875; 43 U.S.C. 1181c), for permanent forest production.

#### Sec. 302. Use

### (a) Authorized uses

A participating county, including any applicable agencies of the participating county, shall use county funds, in accordance with this title, only—

- (1) to carry out activities under the Firewise Communities program to provide to homeowners in fire-sensitive ecosystems education on, and assistance with implementing, techniques in home siting, home construction, and home landscaping that can increase the protection of people and property from wildfires;
- (2) to reimburse the participating county for search and rescue and other emergency services, including firefighting and law enforcement patrols, that are—
  - (A) performed on Federal land after the date on which the use was approved under subsection (b);
  - (B) paid for by the participating county;
- (3) to cover training costs and equipment purchases directly related to the emergency service described in paragraph (2); and
- (4) to develop and carry out community wildfire protection plans in coordination with the appropriate Secretary concerned.

A participating county shall use county funds for a use described in subsection (a) only after a 45-day public comment period, at the beginning of which the participating county shall—

- (1) publish in any publications of local record a proposal that describes the proposed use of the county funds; and

- (A) land within the National Forest System, as defined in section 11(a) of the Forest and Rangeland Renewable Resources Planning Act of 1974 (16 U.S.C. 1609(a)) exclusive of the National Grasslands and land utilization pursuant to the Act of July 22, 1937 (7 U.S.C. 1010–1012); and
- (B) such portions of the revested Oregon and California Railroad and reconveyed Coos Bay Wagon Road grant land as are or may hereafter come under the jurisdiction of the Department of the Interior, which have heretofore or may hereafter be classified as timberlands, and power-site land valuable for timber, that shall be managed, except as provided in the former section 3 of the Act of August 28, 1937 (50 Stat. 875; 43 U.S.C. 1181c), for permanent forest production.

### Sec. 302. Use

### (a) Authorized uses

A participating county, including any applicable agencies of the participating county, shall use county funds, in accordance with this title, only—

- (1) to carry out activities under the Firewise Communities program to provide to homeowners in fire-sensitive ecosystems education on, and assistance with implementing, techniques in home siting, home construction, and home landscaping that can increase the protection of people and property from wildfires;
- (2) to reimburse the participating county for search and rescue and other emergency services, including firefighting and law enforcement patrols, that are—
  - (A) performed on **Federal land** after the date on which the use was approved under subsection (b);
  - (B) paid for by the participating county;
- (3) to cover training costs and equipment purchases directly related to the emergency service described in paragraph (2); and
- (4) to develop and carry out community wildfire protection plans in coordination with the appropriate Secretary concerned.

## (b) Proposals

A participating county shall use county funds for a use described in subsection (a) only after a 45-day public comment period, at the beginning of which the participating county shall—

- (1) publish in any publications of local record a proposal that describes the proposed use of the county funds; and
- (2) submit the proposal to any resource advisory committee established under section 205 of this title for the participating county.
