Survey Committee

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2009 Survey – Process

- Purpose Update the Community Comprehensive Plan that is 10+ years old
- Process CPAC selected a committee in 2007 that met regularly over a 1 ½ year period to develop and design the survey. It was distributed in February 2009.
 - Goal: generate opinions from a diverse population within the community boundary including those not owning property in the area.
 - □ Computer based through "Survey Monkey"; Links sent to 200+ CPAC members by e-mail
 - Notices sent by PCJWSA to all 1300 homeowners connected to water/sewer
 - □ Cooperation sought from area employers and trailer park management in PC/Woods
 - Dependence of Paper Copies made available at the Bank, Library, Community Center and PCJWSA offices
 - □ Announcement placed in the Pacific City Sun

Design

- Expanded 2006 survey to 26 questions from 7 in previous survey.
- Questions were added on lighting, short term rental, roads, facilities, community events, commercial enterprises and vision for the future.

Responses

- A total of 242 surveys were completed
- Respondents answered 26 questions and provided approximately 785 opinions, comments and ideas

Respondents - Residency & Property Ownership

• Residency:

- 58% full-time residents in 2009
- 42% part time residents
 - 62% of part-time residence have primary homes in the Portland/Vancouver area

Property ownership:


 Greater mix of non property owners took survey lowering the percentage of homeowners in the survey base as compared to the 1996 survey.
Success in assuring diversity of respondents


Short term rentals:


- New question in 2009
- 92% of property owners taking survey do not use property for short term rentals

 Majority – 68% come from a 2-3 person household








No. in Household

Why People like to live in Pacific City/Woods


Most folks agreed that they like Pacific City best for.....

What Events Are Most Attended




Events Desired

What Facilities Are Most Used


Current Facility Utilization

- Most often used: Bob Straub Park,
- Kiawanda Community Center and the Library
- Also noted were beaches and boat ramps.



Future Facilities Desired


 Playground and swimming facilities were the most requested



 Other facilities mentioned included, athletic facilities, hiking trails, parks & picnic areas, golf course

What Commercial Enterprises are Desired

- More restaurants, retail establishments and services were noted as enterprises needed both for tourists and residents.
- Of 116 responses to this open-ended question, approximately 152 different opinions were registered. A variety of commercial enterprises were identified. These were tallied and classified into eight categories. The number of responses for each category is shown below.



What Issues should Pacific City/Woods pursue.....

Responses to this group of issues was very similar to the 1996 survey:

Issues most agreed on are

- Protect beach/shore lands
- Protect the Nestucca River & Estuary.
- Have a planning advisory committee
- Request review of emergency warning system

Issues most disagreed with

- Expand water and sanitary boundary
- Support increased taxes for animal control officer

Additional Issues in 2009 Survey

On Development

- Issues most agreed upon....
 - Underground utilities for new construction
 - Ordinance to limit exterior lighting.
 - Ordinance regarding storm water runoff
 - Ordinance that addresses view vs height.
- Issues most disagreed with ...
 - Require screening of recreational vehicles
 - Allow commercially zoned property for residential use
 - More vacation rental housing

On Roads & Environment


Issues most agreed upon....

- Adopt a grading ordinance regarding run-off to adjacent properties
- Require RV's to be parked on owner's lots.
- Pursue further limits of driving on beach
- More public transportation to Lincoln County.
- Common speed limit within community
- Issues most disagreed with...
 - Limiting cutting trees in home building.

Major Concerns in PC/Woods Community


- Top five concerns noted by respondents...
 - Over development
 - Poor roads
 - Growth rates
 - Lack of law enforcement
 - Congested roads & traffic
- Other concerns noted
 - Preserving beauty of environment and the natural resources of the area.
 - Walking & Bike Paths
 - Housing
 - Safety

 Note: 171 respondents took the time to list concerns. Over 400 replies were tallied and categorized.




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Exterior Lighting - Impact on Town Atmosphere



- Lighting can have an adverse impact on the town atmosphere. The type of lighting that respondents felt had the most impact are:
 - Broad flood lights
 - > Ocean/river view lights
 - > Commercial Exterior lights
 - Spot security lights
 - Public street lights
- Those with the least impact were down lighting, motion sensor and farm lights.
- 65% of participants indicated that they would favor shielding current street lights – provided there was no additional cost to them (q-5).


Streets/Roads in PC/Woods Growth Boundary



- Roads in general are a concern
- Maintenance is the primary issue
- Walking and Biking paths were mentioned frequently
- Street conditions were a concern specifically named were:
 - ▶ 3rd Street,
 - Resort Drive
 - Fisher Road
 - Kiwanda Drive
 - Shore Drive.

Short Term Rentals

- **Experience:** About 62% of respondents have had some or extensive experience with short term rentals. While 38% have had no experience at all.
- Regulations: Of 242 respondents, about 50% (120 responses) agreed that some regulations was needed while 40% disagreed with regulation. The remaining 10% had no opinion on the issue.
- Impact on Community: Primarily a neutral position 49% indicated neither a positive or negative impact; 25% a positive impact; 26% a negative impact

What people would like to see in the future

- **Growth:** Slow growth and preference for keeping things as they are now.
- Economic/Commercial Development:
 - A better economic environment with more, jobs, businesses and green commercial enterprises

Diverse Housing Options:

- More varied affordable housing.
- Apartments, planned developments and condominiums
- No public housing and manufactured homes

Development Preferences:

Stronger enforcement of building codes in the community including retaining current lot sizes.

Roads/Transportation:

 Better maintained roads, more pedestrian and bike paths, increased senior transportation

Safety:

- A larger presence of Sheriff's Office, nuisance enforcement, community watch program
- **Sports/Recreation**: Preservation of natural resources, more parks

Vision for PC/Woods in the next 10-15 Years

An Open-ended question prompting 162 folks to make 308 Statements and Opinions about PC/Woods in the next ten years. In summary their vision included.....

- Slow, limited, responsible, well planned growth
- Maintain current character of community retain small town atmosphere
- Desire to protect the pristine area, natural environment and resources
- Develop walking and bicycle paths
- Improve traffic and have adequate parking
- Keep area as a destination where visitors want to frequent
- Desire green commerce, farmers markets, environmentally friendly businesses
- Improve infrastructure— i.e. good sewer & water, roads, traffic plan, lighting
- Other items
 - Economic stability
 - Better law enforcement,
 - Youth activities
 - Art, cultural and historical development

Effectiveness of Land Use Action

- More awareness and concern on land use issues are needed in the community. This is indicated by the high rate of "No Opinion" on this question.
 - On average 30% or 70 responses were "No Opinion" as compared to 10 or 15% for other questions
- Highly and Effective ratings (100 or more responses) were noted for
 - Ensuring adequate parking, dory boat and beach access
- Less or not effective ratings (100 or more responses) for:
 - Preserving rural coastal atmosphere and natural resources
 - Improving roads maintenance and traffic safety
 - Improving bicycle/pedestrian safety
 - Promoting affordable housing opportunities

In Summary – Most frequently noted issues were...

Slow Growth, Maintain small coastal town atmosphere

Better planning, land use and enforcement of building codes

Better economic conditions

- More jobs, More commercial services
- Preservation of the environment and natural resources
- Better maintained roads
- Larger presence of law enforcement
 - Emphasis on Safety & Traffic
- More walking and bike paths
- More affordable housing
- Focus on green commerce
 - Recycling, Farmers Markets, etc

What is currently being done.....

- The Wave started a new route to Otis in Lincoln County
- Short Term Rental Regulation became effective January 2010
- Task Force on Affordable Housing is close to releasing a proposal
- Community Planning Advisory Committee (CPAC) is active in community
- Emergency management meetings are being held to improve coordination
- Citizen's Committee for Sustainable Roads is actively seeking funds for roads
- Sheriff 's office to focus patrols in South County in near future
- Grading ordinance regarding run-off has been proposed
- Tillamook PUD is promoting down-lighting in communities
- PCJWSA has contributed money for lighting
- Proposal is in process to convert BLM land to recreation and open space
- Telecom property sale to convert portion of property to community use
- Tillamook Lightwave fiber optics infrastructure will impact future commercial enterprises

Some options include:

- Review Community Plan and recommend updates
- Explore the discrepancy between the PCJWSA service boundary and the PC/Woods Community growth boundary.
- Evaluate the Transportation Plan for community needs
- Examine current zoning requirements and determine their impact on overall development
- Present results to County Commissioners
- Pass results on to Community groups and citizens
- Other ??????
